MAHA SHIVRATRI CELEBRATION ON February 20, 2012

Abhishek of Lord Shiva from

9:00 am to 12:00 pm

Also, there will be Rudrabhishek and Abhishek performed in the afternoon from

One of the most religious Hindu festivals, Maha Shivaratri falls on the fourteenth day of the dark fortnight of Phalguna (February- March), and is dedicated to the worship of Lord Shiva. Maha Shivratri is the night when He is said to have performed the Tandava Nritya or the dance of primordial creation, preservation and destruction. The festival is observed for one day and one night only. Maha Shivratri is universally observed by all pious Hindus with fasting, singing of bhajans, recital of Sanskrit shlokas, offering of prayers, flowers, fruits and food that is specially prepared in honor of the deity and his divine consort, goddess Parvati. The Puranas contain many stories and legends describing the origin of this festival. According to one, during the samudra manthan, a pot of poison emerged from the ocean. This terrified the Gods and demons as the poison was capable of destroying the entire world, and they ran to Shiva for help. To protect the world from its evil effects, Shiva drank the deathly poison but held it in his throat instead of swallowing it. This made his throat turn blue, and he was given the name Neelakanta, the blue-throated one. Shivaratri is the celebration of this event by which Shiva saved the world. According to another legend in the Shiva Purana, on the 14th day in the dark half of the month of Phalguna, Shiva first manifested himself in the form of a Linga, and this day is especially auspicious and is celebrated as Mahashivaratri. Worshipping Shiva on this day is believed to bestow one with happiness and prosperity.

Mahashivaratri is thus not only a ritual but also a cosmic definition of the Hindu universe. It dispels ignorance, emanates the light of knowledge, makes one aware of the universe, ushers in the spring after the cold and dry winter, and invokes the supreme power to take cognizance of the beings that were created by Him.

Topic of Insurance:

Patel, PE, CLU, who is also our member, to review and demystify the business of insurance for us. Taking examples from insurance of life, health, auto, and property, he will explain how one chooses a qualified and experienced insurance agent, types of insurers, insurance plans, their important features such as liability limits (your financial obligation to others), exclusions and inclusions, conditions and exceptions (what is or is not typically covered) by a given kind of policy, how to file claims accurately etc. etc. This information will help you choosing what is best for you. This will afford us the peace of mind. Please remember that unsuitable insurance choices may not properly protect you from all risks and losses. The talk will be followed by a question-answer period.

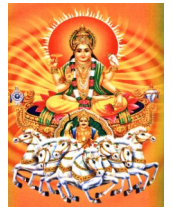
Bal Vihar Program

All ITA Board/Scholarship Committee decisions will be final and not subject to any questions or litigation.

All submissions must be postmarked by March 31, 2012. Please mail the following information and supporting documents to:

- Completed application form.
- Grade Point Average (GPA) – 15% weight points.
- In-school extracurricular activity summary i.e. music, dance, leadership, student council, sports, cultural groups, etc. – 15% weight points.
- Participation in activities related to Indian culture, i.e. participation in ITA-sponsored activities such as the youth program, painting etc. A consistent attendance record will be given preferential treatment among equally qualified candidates) – 15% weight points.
- Community services i.e. volunteering at nursing homes, hospitals, walkathon, etc. – 15% weight points.
- Please choose one topic and submit three duplicate copies (typed and double spaced), not exceeding two pages - 40% weight points..

Indian Cultural Center Foundation Completed !



Our Indian Cultural Center (ICC) construction continues to progress as planned. Thankfully, the foundation was completed before the January winter break – with snow and cold temperature forcing a halt in construction. Our construction committee, construction manager and all the subcontractors raced the clock and the calendar to get the foundation set ahead of schedule before winter forced a pause in construction. As you can see in the photos above, the storage area under the stage has concrete already poured to form a floor. Our building will be constructed using a steel-beam support structure. The necessary steel contract has been awarded and we expect steel delivery in time for the completion of the steel support structure in early Spring. At the current pace of construction, we expect to complete our Center before the end of 2012!

After our foundation-stone laying ceremony on November 6th, our generous donor families have donated \$350,000! We sincerely thank these families and all donors and supporters who have sustained our ICC project thus far. If we are to see the Center come to fruition, we will need to sustain, and even increase, this donation momentum to carry us to the finish line, so we can open the doors to our own cultural center on time. As in the past, we urge all the community members to get involved in this much-needed Center and the time is now for everyone to come on board. We need every Indian family living in and around South Jersey to get involved and take pride in having a one-of-a-kind Cultural Center in our area.

ICC Board of Trustees is very pleased with work performed by Construction Manager Divyakant Parikh of Milan Construction Enterprise for his efficiency and cost-consciousness on our project. As you all know, Divyakant Parikh is hugely involved in our local community – not only as construction manager of our ICC project, but also as the ex-president of our India Temple Association. We can count on him to represent our interests and to get our new Center completed on schedule and within budget!

As always, we are keeping the affairs of ICC transparent to the community. Answers to many of the construction related questions have been posted on our website www.iccofsj.org for your review. Should any of you have any further questions or concerns please contact Dhiraj Panda or Ashvin Patel for clarification of any and all issues.
